

Our Tapestry

The beautiful fabric art displayed on the front wall of the Gathering Hall represents a journey from pain and brokenness to healing and wholeness. The ragged ends of the colours become strong threads, and the dance of knot and loop represent the ways that we hold each other.




Tree of Transformation

A piece of participatory art that we use to recognize moments of transformation. The tree expresses our hope that coming together in community makes space in each of our lives for us to be transformed, whether a person is visiting once or a regular attender. Honour the Treaties Banner

A tangible sign of our commitment to solidarity with indigenous peoples and their rights which were finally recognised here in the Williams Treaties of 1923, and the UN recognition of the importance of supporting global rights and cultures of indigenous peoples.



Words of Commitment

The earth is my home
and the world my family.

As I live every day
I want to be a channel for peace.

May I bring love where there is hatred
And healing where there is hurt,

I pray that I may always try

As well as seeking comfort and understanding from them.

Wherever possible,

This prayer, written by Gretta Vosper and Scott Kearns, is based off the traditional prayer ascribed to Francis of Assisi. It replaced the part of the service where we used to say the Lord's Prayer. As we came to recognize that the words of that traditional prayer represented a barrier to participation to people who don't believe in a personified God, we stopped using it, but we still recognize the value of speaking a commitment together in unison. Many members of our community use this statement for daily devotion at home, and many of us have even brought it into our workplaces and other communities.
